In 2025, we remained committed to a path we know to be right: working within the territories to sustainably strengthen the capacities of farming families.

**Faced with growing questioning, we reaffirmed that international solidarity is not optional:** it remains a fundamental value because it delivers real, measurable results and tangibly improves the living conditions of the most vulnerable.

Once again this year, our approach, built around our three pillars, **“Agroecology – Territories – Enterprises & Value Chains”**, has proven its relevance:

- **Agroecology** continues to demonstrate, day after day, its ability to combine productivity, resilience, and the preservation of natural resources.
- **Territories** are becoming spaces of co-management, where local authorities, technical services, researchers, professional agricultural organizations, and economic stakeholders share their vision and work together to remove systemic barriers.
- **Enterprises and value chain stakeholders** are building “win-win” partnerships that sustainably secure both market access for products and supply chains.

2025 was also a year of expansion and new horizons. We launched new initiatives in Haiti, Morocco, Senegal, and the Democratic Republic of Congo, while strengthening multi-stakeholder cooperation. At the same time, our partnerships diversified: with the research community; with companies committed to supporting sustainable territorial transitions; and with institutions mobilized around resilience and sustainable food.

**Knowledge capitalization and transfer** have played an increasing role in our work.

The development of our digital resource center, the expansion of our e-learning offer, and the active engagement of our teams have strengthened the dissemination of know-how and reinforced the capacities of partner organizations. An essential condition for ensuring the long-term sustainability of our actions.

**The 2025 results, detailed in this report, demonstrate the value of these efforts:** 45 projects implemented in 15 countries, 17,322 family-run agricultural VSEs supported, €135 million in revenue generated, and 86,610 people lifted out of poverty.

Finally, this year confirmed the need for greater rigor in evaluating our actions. In a more constrained budget environment, accurately measuring impact, understanding outcomes, and guiding our choices has become essential. This requirement also shaped the editorial redesign of this annual report, giving greater prominence to human stories, making project impacts more tangible, and linking our results to the transformation of territories with more clarity.

**In 2026**, this momentum will continue. We will roll out a consolidated impact assessment tool, designed to capture, in an integrated way, the economic, social, and environmental aspects of our interventions. It will strengthen our ability to manage the quality of our actions, ensure accountability, and inform our decisions in a spirit of effectiveness and transparency.

**Together with our partners, we reaffirm the same ambition: acting against poverty by supporting sustainable agricultural and territorial transitions, grounded in solidarity, trust, and shared learning.**



**In 2026, we will finalize and progressively roll out Agri360°.**

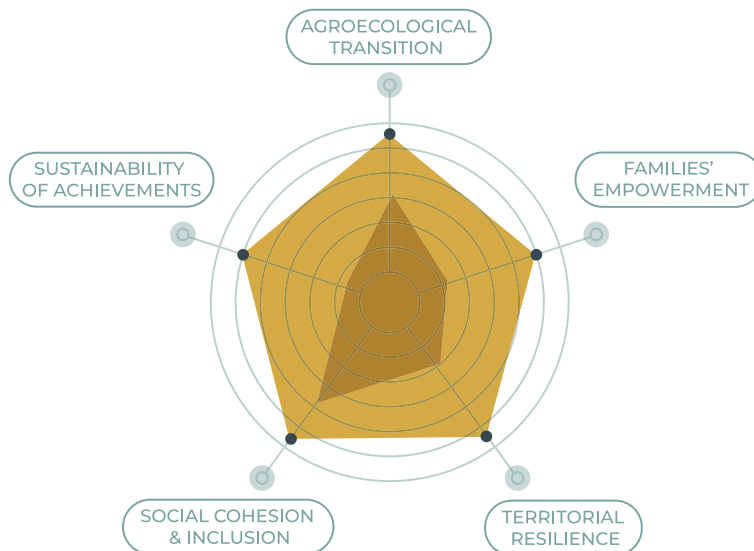
**Our ambition:** strengthening our collective ability to measure impact, make better decisions, and direct our actions where they generate the most sustainable territorial transformation.

## Agri360°

### Rethinking how we measure our impact

For over thirty years, our work has been guided by a core conviction: **bringing about sustainable transformation in agricultural systems**. This can be seen in practices, in incomes, at the territory level, and in the lives of families.

To better capture these transformations in a robust and shared way with our partners, we have developed Agri360°, an impact analysis and management tool, currently in its testing phase.



#### AGROECOLOGICAL TRANSITION:

Level of adoption of agroecological practices by farms and related outcomes (productivity and profit margin).

#### FAMILIES' EMPOWERMENT:

Progress in skills, food security, and income.

#### TERRITORIAL RESILIENCE:

Territory's capacity to withstand climatic, economic, and institutional hazards.

#### SOCIAL COHESION & INCLUSION:

Collective dynamics, local participation, and the role of women and youth.

#### SUSTAINABILITY OF ACHIEVEMENTS:

Long-term viability of supported VSEs and ongoing local dynamics.

**The tool assigns an overall score out of 100**, based on five dimensions (each scored out of 20). Each dimension is assessed through consolidated indicators into an easy-to-read radar chart, providing an immediate overview: strengths, weaknesses, and areas for improvement.

**Agri360° is not a "turnkey" tool:** it is comprehensive, demanding, and requires gradual ownership by both our teams and our partners. This is precisely where its value lies: it enables a nuanced understanding of agroecological progress, territorial dynamics, social inclusion, and income stability.

### Acting on the ground: supporting farms and families

Our work is built alongside families and their organizations, starting from their practices, needs, and ambitions. Together, we strengthen agroecological production systems, improve market access and economic management, and integrate key issues such as nutrition and the environment.

**This first line of work** builds on existing know-how and helps create the conditions for sustainable improvements in income, practices, and local resilience.



### Sharing knowledge: scaling impact through capacity building

Field experience only reaches its full value when it is shared. Through knowledge capitalization, training, tools, and technical assistance, Agrisud strengthens the capacities of other organizations.

**This second line of work** creates the multiplier effect needed to disseminate agroecological best practices, improve project quality, and accelerate agricultural and territorial transitions.

### Influencing practices and policies: embedding change over time

Agrisud engages in awareness-raising and advocacy spaces to promote supporting frameworks for agroecology, sustainable food systems, and family farming.

By contributing to the evolution of public policies and territorial mechanisms, **this third line of work** ensures that local progress is sustained, scaled up, and widely disseminated.

## Context

In Haiti, family farming remains essential for food security and rural household incomes, yet it operates in one of the most fragile contexts in the Caribbean. Three-quarters of rural families struggle to meet their food needs due to highly fragmented agricultural production, severely degraded soils, and intensifying erosion year after year. These structural challenges are compounded by an extremely unstable security and economic environment, disrupting agricultural activities, local markets, and supply systems.

*Despite this particularly chaotic environment, Agrisud manages to maintain its interventions and deliver tangible results alongside producers, by adapting its approaches and relying on the close presence of local teams.*

In the face of such widespread vulnerability, restoring agricultural ecosystems is essential to sustainably secure food supplies for local populations.

### Context

In Laos, family farming forms the backbone of the rural economy and provides most household food supplies. In the mountainous northern regions, many communities remain highly isolated and face the progressive degradation of agricultural and forest lands, as well as strong dependence on natural resources for both income and food.

These territories are among the most vulnerable in the country: high poverty levels, pressure on forests, soil erosion, and limited access to agricultural services. **In this context, sustainably improving production systems and ensuring sustainable management of natural resources are key challenges for strengthening food security and the living conditions of rural families.**

## Context

In Madagascar, family farming plays a vital role: it supports nearly 80% of rural households and structures the country's food system. However, it faces numerous challenges: low yields, strong demographic pressure, limited access to agricultural services, and the gradual degradation of natural resources.

The country is also highly exposed to climate-related hazards: 25% of the population lives in areas at risk of cyclones, droughts, or floods, which regularly disrupt crops and rural incomes. These vulnerabilities result in a concerning food situation, with more than 1.7 million people experiencing acute food insecurity.

Across this vast and diverse territory, these challenges vary from one region to another, making a territory approach to interventions essential.

# HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025

# Our actions to support sustainable family farming

## JANUARY / HAITI

### Exploratory Day of Cassava Value Chain

At the beginning of 2025, Agrisud organized an exploratory day in Cap-Haïtien focused on the cassava value chain, bringing together around twenty institutional, academic, and technical actors to discuss its potential for food security and the local economy.

This meeting allowed participants to share progress made in the Grand Nord region to sustainably strengthen the sector: promoting agro-ecological practices, improving processing chains, and structuring local markets. Field visits showcased concrete impacts for producers, with improved yields and income.

**Cassava, a key crop for Haitian family farming, represents an economic and food resilience lever and was recognized as the “2025 Crop of the Year” by the Ministry of Agriculture.**



The agricultural sector is strategic to ensure food and nutrition security for the population, create wealth and employment, preserve natural resources, and fight against climate change.

With our experience in various contexts, we lead advocacy and awareness-raising actions in order to inform, raise awareness and support change.



## MARCH / FRANCE

### Nutrition for Growth Summit

Held every four years by the Olympic host country, this summit mobilizes the international community – governments, private actors, and civil society – around nutrition. Agrisud, committed to food and nutritional security, participated alongside its partner, the Département des Hauts-de-Seine.

**The roundtable we contributed to focused on the role of local authorities and civil society in improving food security.** The discussions highlighted the sharing of skills and know-how at international level to support more sustainable and inclusive food systems.

**This participation also served to highlight the joint initiatives carried out in several countries and emphasized the importance of decentralized cooperation and multi-stakeholder partnerships.**

## MARCH / CAMBODIA

### “From Field to Wok”

This annual meeting connects the Green Farmers association with chefs in Siem Reap to build sustainable commercial relationships.

The 2025 edition gathered over 80 participants, including two provincial authority representatives who expressed the desire to expand the initiative at the provincial level to amplify its positive impact over the whole territory.

## OCTOBER / FRANCE

### 2<sup>nd</sup> Euro-Africa Biennale

Agrisud took part in the congress held alongside the Euro-Africa Biennale to present concrete solutions to climate crises. **These initiatives, based on agroecology and carried out in partnership with numerous stakeholders, also demonstrated the value of working collaboratively and as close as possible to local realities.**

A 2<sup>nd</sup> highlight of the event was the signing of a framework agreement with IRD (see next page).

## OCTOBER / MOROCCO

### FAR\* International Seminar

Over 160 agricultural and rural training professionals from 18 countries participated. **Agrisud showcased its e-learning platform and led a discussion on the role of online training in agroecological transitions.**

## SEPTEMBER / MADAGASCAR

### Franco-Malagasy Decentralized Cooperation Conference

The 3<sup>rd</sup> edition of this conference gathered nearly 500 participants, including Malagasy and French local authorities, technical partners, and institutions involved in cooperation. Discussions covered decentralization, multi-stakeholder coordination, and financing mobilization through various sector-specific workshops.

Agrisud participated alongside partner authorities to display the results of cooperative actions. The “Agriculture, Biodiversity, and Food” workshop, led by the Région Nouvelle-Aquitaine, highlighted participatory territory approaches and agroecology development. The water, hygiene, and sanitation workshop, led by the Métropole de Lyon, emphasized integrated water cycle management over the long term.

**This conference confirmed the role of decentralized cooperation as a driver of innovation in response to climate, food, and territorial challenges.**



## OCTOBER / FRANCE

### Global Forum on Social and Solidarity Economy (GSEF)

**Agrisud International and Initiative Développement (ID) presented a shared vision of SSE as a lever for “empowerment,” at this event gathering over 10,000 participants from 109 countries.**

The event highlighted both organizations’ role in developing sustainable, solidarity-based economies in fragile territories: as project operators balancing social impact and economic viability, partners in public-private cooperation, and long-term support actors.

A roundtable featured the Madagascar experience with the MEX (Master Farmers) initiative, facilitating access to agricultural services for isolated farms.

Agrisud also co-led an immersive role-playing session and raised awareness of international solidarity challenges on the GSEF radio platform.



# Key moments for our organization

## PARTNERSHIPS 2 new strategic alliances in 2025

Agrisud signed 2 framework agreements: one with the **Fondation Avril** and the other with **IRD**, to amplify the impact of its actions around shared priorities.

These partnerships mark a new step in strengthening our collaborations and our capacity to act alongside committed stakeholders for more sustainable and resilient agricultural and food systems.

### JULY / MOROCCO International Seminar

From July 1 to 4, 2025, Agrisud brought together nearly 50 participants – staff members and partners – in Marrakech as part of the **AGRITER** and **DELFI** programmes, co-funded by **AFD**. Discussions focused on the implementation of actions, their impact evaluation, and future perspectives at both value chain and territory levels.

The **Fondation Norsys** and **Club Med**, partners of Agrisud, contributed to the success of the seminar by organizing field visits and providing logistical support, respectively.

The exchange of experiences encouraged participants to question existing practices and enrich their approaches. Held in Morocco, a country of long-standing engagement for Agrisud, the seminar included field visits that enabled direct dialogue with farmers, local officials, and technical partners.

**The seminar helped strengthen a shared vision of challenges related to agroecological transitions. It also marked an important milestone in the implementation of the AGRITER and DELFI programmes: by bringing together diverse perspectives, participants contributed to consolidating approaches and fostering the collective dynamics behind these two program agreements.**

## 2025 Guidance Board Meeting

The November 27 meeting brought together partners and committed stakeholders around a shared objective: promoting local, sustainable economic development for the benefit of the most vulnerable. Joël Lebreton, Chairman of Agrisud, opened the session by highlighting the critical role of partnerships in achieving this goal.

The roundtable, moderated by Geneviève Féronne-Creuzet – Co-founder of Prophil, Vice-Chair of The Shift Project, and member of Agrisud’s Advisory Council – explored several approaches:

- the partnership philosophy of the Fondation Avril and its motivation to collaborate with organizations such as Agrisud;
- the approach of a mission-driven company like Meridiam and its complementarities with Agrisud;
- the implementation of sustainable sourcing at L’Oréal, illustrated through projects carried out with Agrisud.

Discussions highlighted three major challenges: balancing long-term impact with short-term results; fostering collective responsibility to sustain and scale up initiatives; highlighting success stories to inspire other stakeholders.

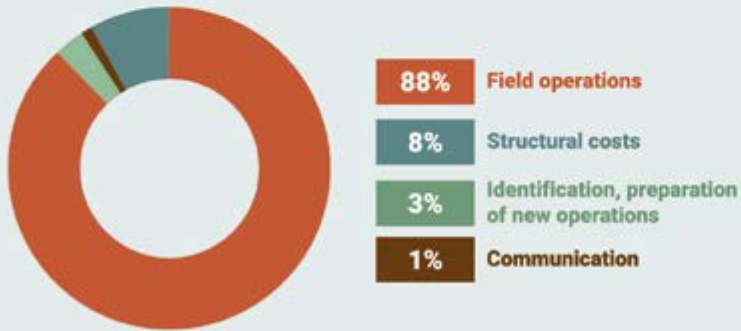

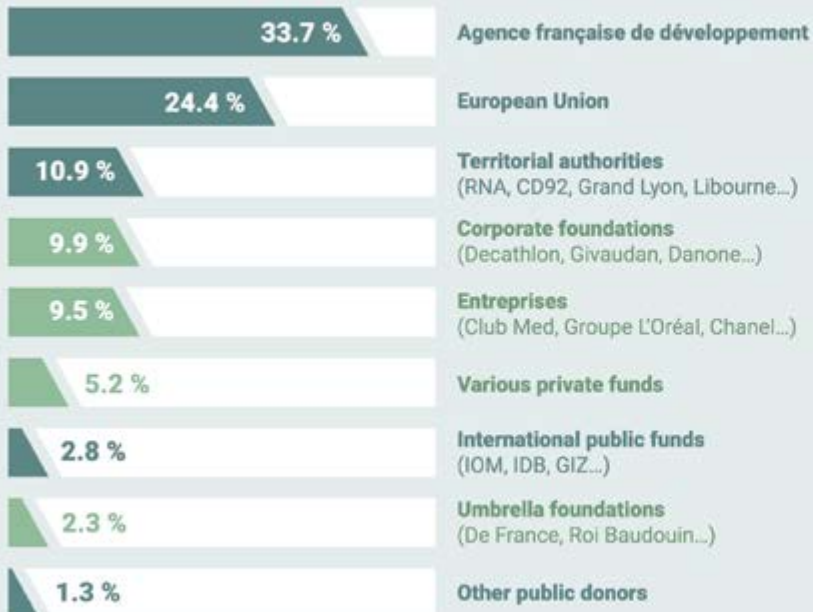

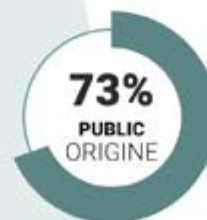
